Colorology is one of those words like femininity. You you usually leave an olo or a few syllables out thinking you spelled it right, but it is indeed colorology. And he is the originator of the specific form of it called name colorology. His book is called Your Name and Colors, Key to Your Beauty, Career, Personality, Romance, and Success. So BP is from the East Bay of the San Francisco.

Bay Area and I welcome him to the show. BP man, glad you're here.

B.P. Greycastle

I'm glad to be here.

Scot McKay

Yeah, man. You know, this is one of those rare episodes where I really just don't know anything at all about what we're about to talk about. So I am all ears listening to you talk about not only what name colorology is, but how you devised this system or this modality or whatever you want to call it. So take it away,

B.P. Greycastle

Okay, well, what named colorology is, it is a theory of mind how the different letters in your name are color-coded. It's a proven fact that all sounds give off a color wavelength vibration. So the different sounding letters in your name give off a different color wavelength vibration. These are all proven facts.

How do you measure that? What scope or what instrument would you use to see that?

B.P. Greycastle

Well, the Scriven actually, he started out with his organ. He would play different notes that would light up different colors on his organ. Also, Isaac Newton used the crystals to show how the different sunlight would be refracted into different colors. And he also aligned the ditonic scale to the musical scale.

of how different notes vibrated at different color frequencies. A person by the name of Roland T. Hunt wrote a book about aligning the colors to the alphabet. Then I took it from there. And the way it basically works is for people to believe this philosophy is I first have to explain a couple other facts. It's a fact that the human body has a lot of water. It's a proven fact that we have crystals in our inner ear. It's a proven fact that we have crystals in our brain. You can Google all of those and you find out they're all proven facts.

Well, as soon as you get a case of vertigo that rocks your world for a few days, you'll know you have crystals in your inner ear for sure.

Exactly. Well, you ask any ear doctor, they'll tell you you have crystals in your ear. And when you do get vertical, a lot of times they'll have you lay on one side. So the crystals kind of reverse back to where they're naturally at. So when's the only time you see a rainbow is when it rains out a little bit and there's the water and the crystals in the air to create a rainbow. It's a form of teleporting, Wi-Fi, even my philosophy, named colorology of receiving subliminal teleported messages.

If you have a problem of saying, well, a lot of people don't get the connection between people's names and colors.
