And I know you don't want to Doc's, anybody in particular. So we're going to talk in general terms here. But I'll tell you, the minimal number of weddings I've been to by comparison to you, I have plenty of stories I can already offer and I have no such fear of calling anybody out. I'm not going to do it by name. But you know, I don't have any professional reason to hide any of my stories. I don't think these people would be listening, let alone coming after me anyway. But I'll tell you to kick this whole thing off. Tell me is it as bad as people think it is? I mean, are brides really that horrible to work with? Do they just go Stark Raving nuts? And I think maybe they play off of my energy as well. Like, I have a lot of experience. So they trust me, and they trust that I've seen a lot of different situations and that they're in good hands. But yeah, I mean, I feel like I honestly, I feel like these girls are more happy and excited than anything else. Yeah, if if there's anything that might get a bride stressed on a wedding day, it could be like unexpected poor weather, you know, that definitely throws their game plan off a little but um, other than that, they really are overall, just really easy to work with and really fun. Yeah, I think that's to be expected. If the weather is going awry on you. That could cause some heartbreak for sure. You know, I'm a little bit surprised to hear you say that. The vast majority of the women you work with are sweethearts and just really excited and giggly about this because you hear so many horror stories about getting into the quote unquote, wedding industry. And you're in New York, no less, which is known for being kind of, you know, not friendly place to hang out. So to hear you say that, I think is heartwarming for a lot of guys. Would you say that most of the women you're seeing get married are with the right guy?

And I am just a geek for extreme competence. And you are definitely it when it comes to taking these photos. And I can see exactly what you're talking about. This guy loves that chick. And you know, as we all know, most people are crappy actors, aren't they, Steven, so you can't get a bride and groom to fake this photogenic adoration for each other. And so I completely hear you about your extreme desire. Yeah. Understood. So let's talk about some of the situations that you find couples in when they're getting married. Very few weddings go as perfectly as planned. I mean, every wedding I've ever been to, which again, isn't nearly as many as you've been to, but every wedding I've ever been to had a glitch, something went wrong. I remember at my aunt's wedding, my sister was about three years old, and they wanted her to be the flower girl and right in the middle of the vows, my little sister Heather spilled all the flower petals everywhere. And sure enough, she bent down and picked them up individually and put them back in the basket in the middle of the wedding vows. So she basically stole the show. This little three year old cute girl doing this, you know, and and it was really cute and everything and we still kind of laugh about it to this day, but I really probably think in my heart of hearts, my aunt would rather that not have happened. as cute as it was. It's hard to be laid back and let things flow. When this is like a woman's princess moment, you know, you said they pick out their dress they spend the whole day getting ready. I mean, that's part of the ritual. Some cultures are a lot more into this than we are here in the western North American countries like United States and Canada. I mean, three day weddings, seven day weddings, the whole Muskoka. You know, a whole lot of ritual, getting ready for days and days and partying for days and days afterwards. I mean, this is a heavy duty thing on marriage. And so there's a lot on the line. I'm curious to hear what you can find out about how couples handle little minor emergencies in the midst of their wedding ceremonies. I'm thinking you know, sometimes the groom slip out and are scrambling and overstressed. Sometimes the bride may even be heartbroken, what's happened? And certainly the interaction between bride and groom might be non existent visa vie these little brushfires and have to be put out, or it may cause the bride and groom to look each other and go, we're going to take this with a little bit of levity, and we're going to power through it. And I'm sure you've seen it all. What What have you noticed out there in terms of how brides and grooms handle these little emergencies?

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Yeah, I mean, um, you know, life is not perfect. So I feel like life will always throw adversity at you, you know, lemons, and it's up to you to make lemonade out of it, which is, you know, that's a popular phrase. And the thing that I see go wrong most often is usually timing. So, it could be, it could be an Uber driver who gets lost or an Uber driver who doesn't show up or a limousine who doesn't show up. But um, you know, we always make the most You know, if if we're stuck in traffic, then we'll turn up the music in the car and, you know, have fun on the way there and make the most of it because, um, even when things don't go right, according to plan on the wedding day, it's still you're still surrounded by your favorite people. And it's still Um, there's always a great moment there. So yeah, I think it always works out somehow or another, it will always work out.

And I feel like the great couples, they embrace the challenges that happen, the unexpected challenges on the wedding day, they really embrace it.

I mean, this is a general cinematic rule. Anytime there is an outdoor wedding that's about to happen in any movie that has any element of comedic structure to it. That outdoor wedding is going to be a disaster. Right? I mean, so I think perhaps I've planted in my mind that outdoor weddings are just born to be disaster prone. I mean, my favorite example is an old James Bond movie called Live and Let Die which takes place you know, in the Louisiana by you and there's a wedding going on. And sure enough, the whole train of boats chasing each other tear through the wedding, like blatantly just power right through the wedding. crushed everything. And of course, a bunch of different examples. The possibilities are endless when it comes to cinematic disasterous not only outdoor weddings, but indoor weddings too, frankly, right? But it's stereotypical is that all becomes sometimes I have to tell you, I've been to several weddings that there were a few disasters brewing. One of them I remember, we went to the wedding, and the reception was afterwards and nobody who was catering the reception playing the reception serving at the reception had been paid, none of them and none of them were going to start doing anything until they got paid. And the this of course, was a tremendous oversight by the best man is what it was. Okay. So the groom, poor bastard. He basically not basically but literally spent the entire time scrambling, getting money together, writing checks, paying people to get the thing going Meanwhile, the guests are standing around going Okay, can we eat here? Oh, yeah. Where's the cake? You know, there's gonna be any music or what? It was just high stress. I'll never forget that.

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I think I might have seen something like that. Except it wasn't people not getting paid. But it was vendors who didn't get fed. So I think the band, they didn't get fed dinner that night.

And I guess they kind of went on strike and just stopped playing music. Like know what the deal was. I really don't know what the deal was. I just know that they were upset. They didn't eat and then the music just stopped. And like, I don't know exactly why at that point, they just didn't feed them and get them back on the dance floor. But it was. I just remember thinking like, this is weird. But um, yeah, I think everyone still had fun that night. But I do remember I do remember that once.

Yeah, For our part, Emily and I got married and of course we adore each other and have for 15 years now. So by no means am I even pretending to imply that if there are troubles in the wedding itself, that you know, it's going to wreck your whole marriage or something or start the whole thing off on a bad foot. It's it's not gonna happen that way. Love is stronger than that, we hope. But the funny part is we love to do karaoke. And this was our second marriage, like I said, so we had karaoke at our wedding. And we had the karaoke. You know, the Kj as they call them, do the wedding music, even pre wedding and during the wedding. And this guy had a very, very strange request. He said, I need everything that you send me all in CDs and an order that you want them played in, and I need them as WAV files, WAV files, those things are like 10 times the size of an mp3 Why don't you just have me give you mp3 is no no, I need WAV files. Dude, I had to have like a separate CD for every song and, you know, a very specific set of pregame music. And then a very specific song that Emily wanted to play when she came down the aisle. And I mean, when the wedding was over, play this music, etc, etc. So I hand the guy the desks about an hour before the wedding starts, he arrives. And he goes, What the hell are these? Which is never a good thing you want to hear an hour before your wedding from the music guy, right? I said, this is exactly what you asked me for these because I can't use these files. I don't know what to do with them. They're a dot wha v format? I go, dude, you asked me for WAV files. Yeah, like you would play like on a Bose wave radio, you know, just music CD files. Can you imagine the look, I gave that guy. I said to that guy said you asked for WAV files, figure it out. Okay. But instead of figuring it out, he hijacked the playlist. You know, actually I alluded earlier to my brother in law saying you need to fix something I will tell you what I needed to fix. Let's get it on by Mark And gay was playing over the loudspeakers at my wedding when people were coming in to the venue. That can't happen, right? So I had to go out there eight minutes before our wedding and say you have got to get this fixed. So finally, he had someone, actually from the audience, teach him how to convert these things to mp3 and get the right. And I said, Do you even know what which one of these songs to play? When she comes down the aisle? He goes, Yeah, yeah, here comes the bride. I go in correct. And he looks at me and stops. He goes, Okay. All right. And that was a disaster. The whole music thing was completely wrong. And all I did was follow instructions. But you know what, at that point, I was a 40 year old guy, and

you know, life is a series of small emergencies. Emily, and I still laugh about it. And how could that guy be such a screw up? You're probably not gonna like hearing this. But our wedding photographer turned out to be even more of a screw up. And one of our friends actually took better wedding pictures than his and we use those to this day. But Wow. You think the second time around, you'd be better at picking people to assist you in making this a great day. But apparently Emily and I both were way too novice at it. But yeah, it's hard to get all of this stuff, right. And even at your own wedding, you know, let alone go into other people's weddings. But I think the audience really suffers for people when they see things not going according to plan. And for better or worse, everybody is watching the bride and groom, almost maybe even with a prurient interest to see what they're going to do, aren't they?

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They are. But I also think people are, you know, they're just excited to be there too. So even if there's no music, or if like the first dance doesn't go, right, people, they tend to overlook a lot of like, the little mistakes if you want to call them mistakes, and then they just have fun, like, even that wedding that didn't have music didn't have a band, you know, everyone was just talking and gathering and mingling and, you know, I think they still had a blast. It just was, you know, not exactly what was planned by the bride and groom.
