And infamously he slaughtered one third of the Cambodian population. So just because something seems like it sucks when someone comes in and says, Hey, I got changed for you, that doesn't mean the change is going to be any better, it could be a lot worse. All these are historical lessons, we've got to understand. One of the things you said earlier was how people kind of get into their own mindset into their own echo chamber, and kind of stay there. And social media allows us to perhaps get a window into what the future is going to look like in terms of how thought is evolving. That's also a lot of people there really because they like to stir up a fight. And there's something wrong in their head. I mean, at least from political Twitter's perspective. And one thing I've noticed hotep I think this would be a great way to, to kind of tie up the show is that most people, when they don't understand something, they fear it and when they fear something, they have it. And that's what creates all these psychological divides between classes, between races between ethnicities, nationalities. And yet, one of the greatest cures for getting oneself into that trap is to go hang out with other people. A lot of men are not spending a lot of time with women. Therefore, they're left to their own devices, thinking about what these women are like and how different they are and how perhaps adversarial they are. And that creates that sense of confusion and then disdain and then bitterness towards women. And I think that is also the seed of racism. It's the seed of any kind of arrogance, one group of people would feel towards the other in my life, the more I hang out with women, the more I realize women are exactly like me, the more I hang out with black folks or Asian folks or Jewish folks, the more I realize, you know, we're all human. Here. We all Have a common DNA, and all of the fire and brimstone and all of the ugliness and all the difference of opinion. All the assertions made about what an entire group of people might believe and what they may be like, it's easy for us to say, hey, look, you know, you're accusing all of us who identify like I do as being a certain way. And I know that's not true. But are we also willing to go look at the people who aren't like, spend more time with them and say, hey, look, here's what these people

are like, in real life. You know, we world score kids and I took my kids to the Arab peninsula. And this was at the height of American negative feeling towards Muslim folks. And my son looked at me eight years old and said, Dad, why do Americans hate Muslim folks so much? These people are being really nice to us. So it all comes down to what the media is telling you about what a certain country is like, or a certain group of people is like, there's an agenda there. We have propaganda just like North Korea does. Fortunately for us right now. We have to party's worth of propaganda and you can choose if it ever comes to a one party state around here, God help us. But getting out and meeting other people takes that boldness, it takes that curiosity. It takes that strength, that masculine courage to go and do because we've been told by other people a message that is scary to do that it may not end well for you. But that's what I found.
