Yeah, 100% I mean, to change us from being that you masculine man, that women actually do enjoy being around from having that confidence, like women want men to have confidence, they don't want the men to be feeble, they want them to be up and say, hey, you know, I'd love to buy you a drink, or, Hey, I'd love to take you out for coffee sometime I was, you know, noticing you and just thought I'd come over and say hi, I mean, where did just pure honesty come out of the equation, right? And it doesn't matter how confident you are, if you're honest, you're going to have a better chance women than just either coming up as a creep or not obviously saying anything you miss 100% of the shots you don't take, right. And so when it comes to these things, though, when we talk about how men are just being I don't know, like the best term for it, but kind of beta ties, if I was going to make one up for myself, is the sense that, you know, it's just that men are so terrified from actually going and approaching women, because of what they're being trained to believe that men are evil and all these different ways. So guys, I mean, there's so many different routes to go on that but I'm going to stick with this one right now is that, you know, guys are just being trained from the inception of what's going on in colleges nowadays, what's being taught in colleges to men, how men are being kind of programmed from college to now being you know, real men in the real world. This new generation of men are being told that all these things to approach a woman is to be hegemonic, and controlling and dominating to insert yourself to think that a woman is just just needs to stop her conversation, or even holding a door open for a woman nowadays, is considered patronizing. You know, it's just like, wow, when did we take away good manners and honesty from just being men, and villainize those, and that's where we're at in today's society. That's what the media is doing. Like you said, the smallest group is got the biggest bullhorn and the rest of us are just living our lives. But it doesn't matter because everybody else is paying attention. Everybody's paying attention to these media outlets. They're paying attention to what's being said, and they're believing the villainize ation of masculinity. They're believing the villainized ation of the male feminine role and they're believing this like, which is This is what a lot of people aren't even talking about, but incredibly toxic to women is to try to push them into these Uber masculine roles. It's incredibly toxic to them, a lot of them are leading, severely unhappy lives. But they're like, Oh, I'm making a lot of money because I'm a boss lady, and I own a business. But I'm completely unsatisfied sexually. I'm unsatisfied relationally. And it's because I can't get out of this masculine push that everybody's told me I have to be now because women are supposed to be that nobody's talking about how toxic that is for women's mindsets either. Just like men being pushed in over feminized ways, or being misaligned with who they are as men, which is causing depression, and it's causing confusion. It's the same thing for women, women are being confused, I get so many women who asked me and asked my wife, where are all the real men out there. So with that, feminization of men, though, we're starting to lose that masculine role that women have come so much to love. Now, while men do evolve, like, if you look from generation to generation, men have evolved, right? And we have

to embrace that evolution of masculinity in today's society, but to actually just feminized men is a completely different thing. And it's not near evolution, which is why women continue to ask us where the real men are in society today. Because guys are shying away from it, they're hiding from it, they're taught that it's not good that it's unhealthy, things like toxic masculinity, which in my opinion, needs to be eradicated from the human vocabulary. But things like that are being tossed around as awesome hashtags in society today. This is this is a problem. And it's a problem for females too, because they're not able to find the partners that they're looking for, it's becoming harder for them to do that. It's becoming harder for them to have happy lives, happy marriages, and happy relationships, it's harder for them to feel sexually fulfilled, right? Because guys don't want to take control in the bedroom. And these, that's also another problem. But so much of this is starting to come out. And we're starting to see a really, really bad trend, in my opinion, in the way that things are going from that perspective, from the influences of media and stuff like that.

Well, yeah, you know, when we talk about toxic masculinity in this culture, it's a weaponized term, it's yet another term that's very carefully crafted to weave a narrative. And that narrative is, hey, you know what guys, your masculine nature is, at its very essence, evil and horrible. Get rid of it. Okay. And what we've talked about a lot on this show, Johnny is men are told that but not given anything to replace it with, we're just told to do better, you know, Gillette commercial stuff from a couple years ago. And that's dangerous, because this villain isation of masculinity leaves a void, which only makes us neuter. So what happens is you have women taking up the mantle of what is actually virtuous masculinity, being a protector being a provider, but they're women, they're not men. So just like men aren't particularly wired to be feminine. And, you know, this is unbelievably what I'm about to say is incredibly, incredibly controversial nowadays, I mean, I may get a bad review or two on iTunes for uttering it. But men are wired to be masculine, and women are wired to be feminine. And I think those driving the narrative know this, right? I mean, when men take on feminine roles, we get movies like Mr. Mom, and they're funny movies, because they're ironic humor. So when women are left to take up masculinity, they're just not man. I'm not gonna go so far as to say they don't do a good job at it, or men are better at it, because that's probably perhaps too politically incorrect for even this show. I mean, look where we've come nowadays. But here's a shower thought for you. Okay? A lot of people, you know, I mean, this is the collective day, right? I'm not really putting a face on this. But if you go on Twitter, you go on Facebook, you'll see a lot of people saying, hey, masculinity has evolved to use the term that you're using. And they have positioned that term and spun it to mean it can be whatever you want it to be. Hey, Harry Styles and address is the new masculine. Now, here's my shower thought as promised, if masculinity can be whatever I want it to be. If it's self defined, then the term doesn't exist. The concept doesn't exist. If it's that nebulous, to the point of being anything you want it to be, then there no longer is any masculinity, because you can't define it. Anything that's a big old, nothing burger doesn't exist. So basically, they've channeled masculinity into oblivion. Now, here's the crazy part. There's no battle against femininity. We're cool with feminine stuff. Women still have to be feminine. Men can be feminine and brand themselves masculine. So now we are celebrating one One side of this polarity while banishing the other side to elbow for eternity. It's just nuts. And yet, here's another example of where nobody's thinking a chess move ahead saying, wait a minute. How can this possibly be the case? Right? Mm hmm. A couple of years ago, one of the most feminist celebrities female celebrity issued an apology, because she was risking being the target of canceled culture for saying that women have vaginas. So she wanted to apologize to retrain sisters, for not acknowledging that not all women have vaginas. I never forget what my lovely

wife said to me when she heard about that story. She goes, she's a feminist. Right? Right. Yeah, this is toxic masculinity. Men are so wonderful features female, blah, blah, blah, right? I said, Yep, she goes, Oh, and that's the only word I have to say. She's just been owned by a bunch of men. And that was my wife who said that, you know, vagina owner, my wife, by the way, of course. And I just, I didn't laugh, because it's sad, you know? Now, listen, I have taken up for trans causes. In the past, I understand that not everybody is wired the way you and I and my wife and maybe a bunch of other people are and I've got to respect people's differences. I once had to attempt and I mean, it turned out I was shouted down for this. That, you know, when someone comes along and says, they're an intersex, transsexual, and you're poking fun at them, or saying you don't agree with their lifestyle choice, it's not a lifestyle choice. And I'm being shouted down. And I said to these people, you need to go look up what intersex means. This guy has had a very, very tough young life. And I didn't want to, like I know what it means. I mean, if he wants to pretend he's the other gender fine, I go, I'm just recusing myself from this conversation. Because people will not do any research anymore. They'll get in their little echo chamber and be comfy, right. And as a side note, lately, I've noticed that some of these people instead, echo chambers even go so far to say that none of you people are doing any research, none of the things you're finding on the internet, none of your self taught self thinking even counts anymore, unless it's a scientist who's done a peer reviewed study. So I mean, you have even the masses piling on in this quest to dumb us all down, literally. But again, that's a side note. And, you know, I am a man of faith. And I am a man of reasonable fee. And yet, it's amazing to me how many people have been brainwashed by fear, in the name of religion, over the years, I mean, it's kind of a fact. Yet there are a lot of people who espouse a certain faith who want to deny that ever happened. And what we're seeing happen nowadays, and this is in line with me saying politics is the new religious faith is people are being brainwashed, and mind controlled by this new religion. And I just really think it's sad. And I think it's especially sad for the state of men and women in our relationships together.
