So he's doing it kind of insidiously, trying to ingratiate himself to into into the heart of a woman so that she sees Oh, man, I have all these bad guys I've been dating but I look at you, like Hollywood

perpetuates this, this ridiculous myth. And that the nice guy finishes last and wins at the end in order the romantic love story. And it's not true. And women can't respect that. They're not attracted to it. You know, that's a prime example of what so many people in the men's dating advice world referred to as giving your power away. That's a quintessential example of it. And the other type of Mr. Nice Guy behavior. The other shadow of it, if you will, is that you're trying to get something. It's a selfish motive. It's like being a greedy salesperson, and running a bunch of Zig Ziglar tactics on allegedly unsuspecting customers and frankly, disrespecting their intelligence enough to think that they'll just open up their wallets and hand you the money. Whereas a lot of guys don't respect women enough to think that they have agency over their own sexuality. And if I just run the right game, or perform the right trick, this woman will spread her legs for me, and then I get what I want. And then we're done here. So it's this combination of selfishness and fear. That just becomes flat out straight up disgusting to women. It's the opposite of what heterosexual masculinity does to attract women, right?

What you're talking about, though, dovetails right into that concept, and plays into it quite nicely. Because if we're going to talk about this divine inspiration for women being Beloved to us, and almost forces the conversation on this idea of masculine Beauty and femininity, indeed being divinely inspired as well. I mean, this is the divine intelligent design, if you will, of how the dance of masculinity and femininity, the dance of sexuality is supposed to work. And indeed, you know, there are these very dogmatic denominations, even in the Christian church, and certainly in other religions as well, where sex is deemed bad. It's a man standing on the surface saying, I'd like nice things. I want my life to be arranged with around nice things. And how do I want my life to be arranged. So he sees a woman over there. And he says, I don't know that woman. That's a statement of truth, I would like to know her. That's a statement of truth. She's attractive to me that statement of truth, I would like to see her again, those are four statements. Aristotle said, begin with first principles. So as a first principles, statements that nobody in the world can say, that's not true, I reject that. So all you have to do is move forward with that clarity of I know what I want, which is in simply as I just like, the way she looks, and I would like to get to know her. Those are statements of truth that are that are sincere in your heart. And you can walk up to and say those two things. I was over there with my friend, Scott, I saw you over here, I had to come say hello, because you're attractive to me. And I would like to know you. Those are five statements that just said his opening lines, not a question in there. There's no neediness in that it's complete, straight, clear eyed desire going forward. And it's beautiful. And she might say, Well, I'm married to a boyfriend, I'm not interested. But at least you stood on this earth and did your role. At least you left nothing to chance the ball is in her court, she can pick it up, she can look at it, she can walk away. But at least you can go home that night. I think when guys say what flirting is, is for Simps or being romantic is for soft, guys. It's just an excuse not to do it. It's an excuse to cling to your fears what it is, because deep down we know this is what women want. We've seen every movie. So we know straight up, that women respond very powerfully to this. But because we either don't know how to do it, or we fear that rejection that you just talked about, we make an excuse and cling to the fear. The other thing that guys are afraid of is bothering women nowadays, because we've been fed this narrative that women don't like men, women don't like sex, and they would rather we just stay away from them, which again, is a falsehood. It's just not in line with men and women being created to be in community with each other. So here you comes in talking about how a guy can be very authentic, very forthright, and simply state is truth that I saw you from the other side of the room and had to meet you. What is there to reject there? What is there to be bothered by there? We're so afraid we're going to bother women. It's just simply a statement of approval and affirmation to a woman and no red blooded human being male, female or otherwise is going to be offended by that or feel like they have to respond to it and aggression. Now, I will acknowledge this idea of fear based aggression that my friend Mark gholston talks about where women sometimes live lives in such fear within themselves and within their psyches, that they automatically respond to anything unexpected with aggression. I do understand that happens but as we've said in this show before you You stand in the gap and just wait it out a sentence or two. And she'll go, Well, you know, you're right, I shouldn't be so aggressive, I'm sorry, my name is Carolyn or whatever. But you talked about this idea of being needy versus having genuine desire. And I'll tell you, to me, in my vernacular, that's the difference between chasing and choosing. Men who are chasing women, for their own needy, personal gain, are going to be found to be repulsive by women, because that doesn't make them feel safe. It doesn't make them feel comfortable. Yet, the man who says to a woman, I'm choosing you, there are lots of women in this room, I'm talking to you, I find you most intriguing. That is, in turn very intriguing to the woman and it's very sexually attractive. And it's romantic. It's certainly not something you do when you meet another dude. I mean, you can admire another dude, you can respect his work and be very happy to meet someone prominent at a party. And he may even gush over them a little bit. But there's a difference between that and going up to a woman as a man, and acknowledging the femininity in her and how your masculinity is, is empowered, or inspired by it, or, you know, let's be straight up turned on by it. And that is the very kernel of romance. Everything that you do from there, whether you have a drink, or you're making her laugh with

jokes, or have a candlelit dinner, or whisper in her ear, anything that's sensual that comes from that is helping this woman's sensual being ignite with desire in her own right. And that sounds kind of esoteric, but we've given some very specific examples to it, you know?
