



We've seen evidence of that, since Roe vs. Wade in 1973. I don't think it's about to reverse itself. But there's just something about human beings, cheapening the life of their own offspring to the point where we can just kill them because we feel like it. That just feels like it doesn't bode very well, for the human race. That's actually the linchpin for me. Now, the other thing that a lot of people do, I'm sure you'll want to talk about this is they engage in logical fallacy like a big dog. I mean, there's the all or nothing logical fallacy everywhere, just like to be fair to people on the left and the right. A lot of people in the right will knee jerk when they're trying to ban bump stocks, for example, which actually enable a semi automatic weapon to act a lot more like a fully automatic weapon. People who are second amendment advocates, you know, to an extreme, say, hey, you know what, this is only the first step, when they come after your bump stocks. The next thing you know, they're gonna come after your hunting rifles and your BB guns, and then your water pistols. Oh, my God, you know. What about the fear mongering aspect of this? Isn't that really just mind control, which is what we're actually really trying to defeat here?

## Dr. Joshua Estrin 32:53

You know, it's an, it's a complicated topic. And when, when it's this big, what I usually do is, you know, I start with myself, because at the end of the day, where else can I start? And, you know, some people find it fascinating that I'm, personally, personally to make this very clear, pro life insofar as if I had a uterus and became pregnant, I don't think that I could make the decision to have an abortion, yet at the same time, and I know, I'm not the only one who have expressed it this way. I don't believe that, because of that, I have a right to impose that no one else should get an abortion. And having said that, I begin to then expand it kind of like a dartboard, you know, that's my bullseye. I believe this yet I want to give people the space to appropriately Express and believe and have the right to do something other than than I believe in. And there are so many different layers here. You know, you and I talked about it briefly before the show, if

we're going to take the right to contraception away, just condoms, for instance, you know, how are we going to navigate STDs and STIs? I mean, there would there's, it's not? Exactly there are so many other issues and reasons why people use quote, condoms, aka birth control, other than controlling birth. And subsequently, we need to be ready to to have those discussions or just say, as you said, Now, many times during the course of the show that the question on the table or the issue on the table isn't always what it is. And when we peel back that thin veneer, it stinks of politics.

Of course it does. This is why when we start talking about parental rights, there's a lot of talk about gender affirming treatment for minors, or abortion being granted to minors without parental consent, when virtually any other medical procedure requires it and nobody's arguing otherwise. So when someone says As a you know, shouldn't kids be at least post puberty before making permanent gender decisions? Isn't this really something that parents should have at least the right to know, is being talked about with their kids? I mean, my wife put it kind of succinctly, I bet they're stuck with the bill afterwards, regardless of what happens. And it really does smack of politics, doesn't it? That's why when this political agenda starts superseding, really rights we consider to be extremely basically the right to raise our kids as we see fit. It becomes a huge political talking point with the upcoming elections. And really, I think this deep leverage, which really, again, Josh feels a lot like turning activism into revenge based hate. I think these are going to become huge issues. And I don't think they're going to stick ultimately,

it's an interesting point, you know, there was a time in my professional career where I was practicing as, as a sa a clinical therapist. And, you know, I had the responsibility if if an underage child came to me and expressed suicidal ideations, to talk to their parents about it, but there was, there was, right, there was a caveat to that, that, if there was a situation where it would put the child at risk, I had to navigate a very, very precarious and slippery slope. And so for me, again, it's about understanding one of the responsibilities and priorities about being a parent is again, understanding. And so we have a responsibility to educate parents and have what I call those difficult discussions about uncomfortable topics. And the vast majority of parents will never have to navigate this gender identity issue. But enough parents will that what kind of discussions do we have to have with the parents and future parents so that this isn't jarring and alarming to the point of, you know, children being at risk, and not only because they're going through this period, where they, they really are questioning who they are, and how they fit into the world, and parents can be supportive. And again, they don't need to be accepting right off the bat, but at least or at the very least, understand that this is real, this is what your child is going through? And what can you do to the best of your ability to be the most supportive loving parent, because, you know, none of us signed on as parents to understand or have a crystal ball as to what was coming down the pike, so to speak, you know, God forbid, your your, your child goes to the doctor, and you're told they have cancer? Did you? Did you go into having kids thinking, you know, my kid is going to have a terminal illness, there's a learning curve. And and there's so much that as parents, we have a responsibility to, to step up to the plate and learn and this is just another one of those things. And do I want the government to be stepping in and deciding what my child is told or not told? I don't, I don't. And yet, at the same time, if we're going to have sex education in the school, we can't cherry pick,

as you said, only those issues that are, you know, heteronormative, so to speak. And so, you know, this is where we have to get real with ourselves, right, Scott, and as you said, we can't say, you know, government needs to, you know, tell these people that they can't get abortions, but you know, I can't basically have a semi automatic, you know, in my living room, and and that's where we don't have the luxury to dig in our heels and just bring the conversation to a hard stop. Because this is not the end of the discussion. It's not the end of our lives. This is not the end of owhat America is going to look like. And if it is, if we're if we're at the end of our our evolution and revolution as a country. Wow, I'm going to walk into the water again, and just take me because there's, there's distance to travel. And that's both concerning and exciting, to be honest with you.

Yeah, two things there. First of all, common sense, should be common. It should be something we can all agree make sense. Yet, it seems to me when things get politically loaded, common sense is leveraged for political expediency to the point of not making any sense anymore, let alone common sense. So there's that. Second of all, you bring up a fantastic point that I want to underscore here, which is parental rights, properly granting parental rights back to the parents. Absolutely doesn't mean that we've abolished parental ignorance.

And you know, Can we all just admit that it's really hard to be a parent? I mean, puberty is the universe's joke. It's just, you know, anyone in a parent or is a, you know, is a guardian or who has ever had to navigate puberty with it with a young one. It's just like, holy cow. And exactly, you know, my heart goes out to my fellow brothers and sisters who happen to be procreating are who have adopted or who are taking that parental role, because, you know, I've got kids now in their 30s. And they're just starting to look at me with that glint in their eye that says, you know, what, maybe you know, a thing or two about a thing or two, but wow, that whole adolescence, pre adolescence, pre puberty, puberty, parents out there, it's brutal. You're you're really doing the best you can and the more knowledge you have, I guarantee you, the easier it will be,

you know, I call that the knucklehead stage, at least as far as boys are concerned, from about 10 to 13. Men, my sons were just knuckleheads. I mean, no responsibility. Teenagers are selectively death. Yeah. Yeah, right. Exactly. When you ask any teenage boy a question he's going to answer with what you like Brett from Pulp Fiction. And yet something sort of magically happens, at least we hope so. And trust. So around 14 or 15 years old, where they start acting a little bit more like young men, and you can actually see the light at the end of the tunnel. That's what's going on with my younger son right now. Fantastic. Fantastic. I think they would come at me with torches and pitchforks. Josh, if we didn't at least talk about the Florida quote, unquote, don't say gay bill. And that sort of hits it right down the fairway here. That bill is a five minute read. And based on Twitter, I don't think anybody's actually read it. They're just once again, wait for it, doing what they're told by their political side, there are pining as they've been told to a pine. The bill does not say does not even mention the word gay and correct. So it's sort of dishonest to say it's a don't say gay bill, because it doesn't say Don't say gay, it just simply doesn't say gay. The gist of the bill is, if my kid is from K to three, kindergarten to third grade here, I mean, none of us have hair on our crotch is in third grade.

Now, that's great. Well, that I can never unsee.



Yeah, well, I'm just saying I didn't. And the stipulation, again, I think it's this fear mongering is being made. Any of the stipulation is please don't talk to our kids, in school, as teachers, as administrators, as janitors, about anything having to do with sexuality, or procreation. It doesn't even mention sexual orientation at all. In other words, if you're an activist teacher, and you want to teach my first grader, that sex is of the devil, because you're a Christian bible thumper, and they should they should abstain from sex all the way to adulthood until they get married. You're still in violation of what this bill is talking about. Yet the fear mongers out there are saying, hey, because this is Ron DeSantis, because this is being proffered by Republicans, what they're really trying to do you know, the old argument about dog whistling to your base, you know, which brilliant, by the way, allows you to put words in other people's mouth that they never really said, this is all dog whistling to say, hey, if you're LGBTQIA, we don't want you talking to our kids. And they give all these examples. And of course, the people who are the loudest voices in opposition to this are LGBTQIA folks and allies. But at the baseline of this bill, I really don't think I want teachers talking to my kindergartner, and my first grader, second grader, third grader about these issues, they should get up there and teach. They should teach arithmetic they should teach reading. Just recently, the Vice President of the United States was giving a presentation where she said teachers should be allowed to express their views freely to kids and and tell the kids what their values are. And I'm thinking like, really? I mean, should I be able to go sit at my kids teacher's kitchen table and express my values to her and her family over dinner tonight? I don't think that's the place of teachers. I don't think it's the place of the collective village ala Hillary Clinton to raise my child. I think this is up to the parents who birth those children pay the bills and are raising them who they come home to at night. And yet again, politics may have driven the Florida legislature's goals here. I'm not saying they weren't thinking about that at all. But the bill becoming law can really only enforce what it says it enforces. And, you know, I really think again, people have to return to common sense and think for themselves rebills for themselves and stop the fear mongering, you know?

You know, I can't say that I wholly disagree with you that the thing about that bill that concerns me the most, and I actually, you know, hail from the state of Florida is that it's ambiguity. There are some some areas that again, become slippery slopes. So for instance, what do we do with the child in kindergarten or first grade who comes in and starts talking about their two mommies or two daddies? In some places like Miami Dade or Fort Lauderdale, Broward County, Palm Beach probably wouldn't be an issue. You go a little more north. And it might be what do we do with the school district? I believe it was in Orange County, Florida, that has asked teachers to not have their same sex partners photo displayed in the classroom. As a result of this, quote, don't say gay bill.

We'll see. I think that's the other side. Being heavy handed from a dogmatic perspective, trying to enforce things that aren't specifically talked about in that bill. I think that's equally fallacious.

Dr. Joshua Estrin 46:21

Exactly. And so I've really tried to synthesize and understand again, both sides of the argument and, you know, if I was a parent, I wouldn't want my my kindergartener to be taught about the birds and the bees anywhere else. But home, you know, hetero or otherwise, there's just no, there's no place for it. But I would want a space where the books that they're read, reflect the world that they're entering into. And the reality is that in this world, as it was in the past, just probably not so much out there, so to speak in front of you. There are kindergarteners with two mommies or two daddies. And so why wouldn't they be read books where that's reflected much like they would see books where mommy and daddy aren't of the same race. And so this is the problem when we bring politics in. The intention should be that our children have an education, especially at that young age at that foundation that can be built upon so that they become productive citizens of the world.

Yeah. Well, I mean, everybody should be respected kids, teachers, adults from both sides. And when it becomes a partisan battle, and kind of bring in this full circle, Dr. Josh, it becomes his quest to be right. And if you don't agree with me, you're not only wrong, you're flat out evil. I mean, that's what led to Rwanda. Right. And the irony there is, the only reason we probably think Rwanda could never happen here is, ironically enough because of racism. And what I'm saying there, just to be completely point blank about it is plenty of the same people who are so quick to blame others and fear and pronounce others who are different from themselves as evil Nazis or whatever, are the same ones who were too ignorant, frankly, to understand. That's exactly where we're headed nowadays. I mean, it only requires a cursory knowledge of the Rwandan massacre, to know that it was the people who were told they were the oppressed ones, the Hutus, who were riled up by the media, he asked, that's exactly what happened to go and make a violent preemptive strike against the Tutsis who were perceived as the quote unquote, privileged ones, and their oppressors, you know, get them before they get you. And that's exactly the mentality we're seeing here in Western culture nowadays, and it's scary, and the media is certainly doing nothing to help solve the problem. And I am including both the left leaning and the right leaning media in that pronouncement. And history simply cannot repeat itself here, or in Africa or in Asia or anywhere else, frankly. So here it is, regardless of your My or anybody else's perception of someone else's culture, and how quote unquote, developed their country is the simple fact If human nature remains the same, there are humans, we're humans. And we start villainizing entire social groups of people just because they're different than we are or disagree with them, or we're afraid of them, which is what happened in Rwanda. Not only may we end up having a civil war, we may end up packing each other to death. And I don't think that's an overstatement.

I don't think it is either. It's it's a brilliant point. And it's why you do what you do is that we simply need to understand that part of what makes us so deliciously human, is that we're different and different, does not mean a wrong, different does not mean better. Different just

means different. And we have so many examples in history of genocides that were started out of this need to be right. And fueled by their differences. Exactly. And so you know, again, trying to bring, bring it full circle. If I understand you, it's very hard for me to be afraid of you, I don't have to like you. I don't have to agree with you. I don't have to hang out with you. But if I understand you, then the fear isn't there. And if the fear isn't there, then then we don't react out of a place of again fear which oftentimes leads to violence, which then escalates. And so I am a I am a an activist for only one thing understanding
